NEW DAY- a glimpse into the everyday lives of our Team Leaders John Kalenzi, Team Leader of AE Rwanda

I get up at 5 in the morning and pray with my family. After breakfast I leave for work at around 6:30 am. I pick up a cup of coffee from the coffee shop and when I get to the office, I read and respond to emails waiting for me. From 8 am to 8:30 am we have staff morning devotions, after which I have meetings with different departmental heads to offer a sense of direction. AE Rwanda is a huge organisation with 480 staff members. I also attend different government, organisational or church meetings outside the office.





I have lunch at the AE office at 1:00 pm, during which time, I have an opportunity to chat with different AE staff members, to get to know them better and have a deeper connection with them.

When we have partners visiting us, I sometimes accompany them on a visit to field projects - or preach in different areas of the country where AE operates.

I leave for home at 8:30 pm, and drive for 25 minutes - if there is no traffic jam. After supper around 9:30 pm, I go to bed.

"AE South Africa's main Youth programme is called the 'Foxfire Youth Team'. This is a year-of-your-life live-in course for young people aged 18-24 from previously disadvantaged backgrounds. During their year at AE, the Foxfire team members receive leadership and ministry training, as well as participating in mission work (primarily to other young people) around the country and even beyond our borders.

This life-changing programme costs R120k (£ Sterling 5,000) per Foxfire member, and we hereby humbly request you to consider partnering with us."

Afterwards, some of the Bonginkosi folk showed us the lovely items they had made from the fabric we brought last month. The folk were very thankful too for the food items of porridge, powdered milk and fruit - as well as more fabric for the sewing ladies."
